Number	Title	Location on map	Description
1	Guildhall	Market Place	Bailiff collected Bishops fees here in 13 <sup>th</sup> Century. The Guildhall had prison cells until 1848 and had a court room until 1964
2	Great North Gate Goal	Saddler Street (halfway up between Hatters and The Georgian Window shops)	The original city wall's Great North Gate was a Gaol until 1421
3	Owengate	Now the University Law Department	Halmote Court Buildings was the Bishop's manorial court 1850 dealing with small misdemeanours, debts and copyhold land transfer until 1952. The building also used by Durham Court Chancery until 1971, one of the last remnants of the palatinate powers enjoyed by the bishops.
4	Palatinate Assize Court	Palace Green, now University Library	Site of the Palatinate Assize Court 1588-1822
5	Windy Gap	The gap from Palace Green which runs down to the riverbank	Burial place of Scottish Prisoners after the Battle of Dunbar 1650
6	Broken Walls		Monastery Wall window to monastic prison or lying house
7	The College	Toilet block, Palace Green	Originally monastic stable, prison and master of Infirmary's offices. Spiral staircase leads down to basement prison
8	Durham Cathedral Cloisters/Undercroft		East Range. Undercroft and prison remain from Walcher's construction  Chapter House – Door in south wall of chapter house led to prison for minor offences, with two small cells to the South which were under the stairs of the original dormitory
9	The Cathedral	Durham Cathedral	Was used as a prison camp to imprison 3,000 Scottish prisoners in 1650 by Oliver Cromwell. The Sanctuary Chamber

			below night stairs from dormitory. Sanctuary allowed claims for immunity for 37 days from secular law. The original Sanctuary Knocker is 12 <sup>th</sup> Century
10	Assize Courts and Gaol	Now Crown Courts	Assize Courts 1809 Goal 1815, prison extended between 1868 and 1876.
11	Old Prison Green	Outside current courthouse	Public executions took place on the prison green from 1816-1865. House on old Elvet said to have cast iron balcony installed to provide a grandstand view. Today's court façade includes put-log holes for execution scaffolding
12	House of Correction	Evet Bridge under the bridge arches near the Boat House	House of Correction 1632-1819, a minor prison for vagrants, prisoners on remand for misdemeanours, Jimmy Allen, the Gypsy Piper connection
13	Court Inn on Court Lane	Today's Court Inn and Coury Lane	Popular hostelry for prison officers
14	Tythne Barn Prison Officers Club	As today, Tythe Barn/Prison Officers Club	Prison Officers Club
15	Original Victorian Durham City Police Station	Off Court Lane	Original Victorian police station now apartments
16	Current Durham Police Station	Elvet/Court Lane	Functioning Durham Police Station in Durham City
17	The Old Court House	(Now Oxfam) Elvet Bridge	
18	The Story - New Durham Archives	Mount Oswald	New home for the Durham Archives containing historical records until present time.
19	George Gently Filming	Hotel Indigo, Old Elvet	Filmed at various sites throughout Durham including Hotel Indigo/Old Shire Hall, where a Bank Robbery scene was staged

20	Durham University Department of Sociology	32 Old Elvet	Criminology and Criminal Justice
21	Durham Constabulary HQ	Aykley Heads	Area Headquarters for Durham Police
22	Harperley Hall College of Policing's Forensic Centre	Wolsingham, Crook	The College of Policing is a professional body for everyone working across policing. It is an operationally independent arm's-length body of the Home Office.
23	Police Station at Beamish	Beamish Museum	A pair of police houses from Heworth, Gateshead, and their associated single-storey office, are set to be replicated at Beamish. Supported by the North-East Police History Society.
